rowing from a family of five to nine - two parents and seven children — took Amy Wolfmeyer from a stay-at-home mom to one of the top sales associates at a local car dealership and she shows no sign of slowing down, all while caring for her children.

Just before moving from Olive Branch, Mississippi, to Jonesboro in 2011, Amy and her husband Matt welcomed son Michael to their family, adding to children Clayton, Kyle, Alyssa, Brent and Eli. A short six weeks after Michael's birth, Amy said she learned she was pregnant with her daughter Allison.

"I knew me going to work at that time was not happening due to my heart being at home to raise them," she said.

Amy worked for mortgage lenders and title companies in Memphis and transitioned to being a stay-at-home mom for Clayton, Kyle, Alyssa and Brent before marrying Matt, but said working from home was hit or miss and not something she could rely on. The Wolfmeyer's moved to Jonesboro for Matt's job and once all the children were old enough for pre-kindergarten, Amy began hunting for a new career and found a listing for a sales associate at Frank Fletcher Dodge Chrysler Jeep Ram. "Since I didn't have any professional sales experience I didn't even think they would call but they did," Amy said. "Within 30 minutes of sending over my resume I had a scheduled interview for the next day."

Amy started selling cars in November 2015 and has since been the top sales associate every month. In December she sold 27 cars and was the top employee out of not only the Jonesboro Fletcher location, but all Fletcher dealerships.

"There has only been one woman be Number One within Fletcher that I am aware," Amy said. "So I was the second, along with being the first woman to ever be Number One out of all Fletcher locations." She hit that achievement again not only in January, but in February for three consecutive months.

"That I am aware of, there has never been a woman, much less a mom with seven kids, be able to pull those accomplishments," she added.

In less than a year Amy has become known as the Make It Happen Fletcher Dodge Girl thanks to her ability to get a vehicle to nearly every customer who walks through her door. Her success has exploded over social media, leading to her MakeItHappenGirlFletcherDodge Facebook page. Every closed deal ends with a photo for her social media accounts to spread the word. She said the best part of her job is sending customers off with a new car after they felt they had no options.

"I have had customers cry, literally, just because to them it's a sheer miracle," Amy said. "I never dreamed I could make money doing something I loved."

Even customers with good credit and cash in hand walk away from the lot after a great experience with Amy and are impressed with how she can pull off a deal.

Amy's family has had her back during the entire transition of moving from a stay-at-home mom to working full-time.

All seven children love having their mom work and ask every day how many cars she sold. Amy said they rejoice in the good times and support her during the hard times. •

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


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Paragould High School Economic Stock Market Winners

aragould High School students placed 1st in the region in the Economics Arkansas Stock Market Game, an investment simulation program for students in grades 4-12. Approximately 2,450 (7,300 students) teams participated in the spring 2016 session. Paragould High School came in 1st place over 161 teams. They won 44th overall (in the top 2%).

Albert Tiner, PHS teacher and facilitator, also participated in the teacher division and won 2nd place in the statewide competition. Around 47 teachers participated.

Economics Arkansas, a nonprofit education organization that trains educators how to integrate economics and personal finance concepts into the K-12 classroom curriculum, hosts the Stock Market Game program each fall and spring semester. It is a project-based investment simulation designed to teach saving and investing while also enhancing students'

math, business, communication, economics and analytical skills.

Economics Arkansas will host a luncheon on May 10 at Verizon Arena in North Little Rock to honor the first- and second-place winners. The junior investors will receive cash awards, medallions and awards for growing a hypothetical stock portfolio of \$100,000 to use over the course of 10 weeks. •





Remembering Days on the Water

he cypress lined oxbow looked very inviting as Dad and I launched the boat into the familiar waters. A light breeze and eighty degree temperatures meant the bream would be heading for the shallows and we were there to find the sweet spot where some of the little fighters had gathered. Our "fishing basics" included a sculling paddle, telescopic fishing poles, some terminal tackle, and a tube or two of crickets. We also carried Vienna sausage, a few crackers and a few drinks, which shared a cooler with the fish we caught to give us more room in the boat.

Due to Dad's accounting profession, much of the fishing around the Long home did not start until after April 15. Usually it was into May before we hit the waters in earnest but then we would fish for hours looking for just the right spot to fill the cooler with some big bream. There was never much conversation as Dad sculled us in and out of the cypress looking for beds of fish preparing for the spawn. We were too focused on catching fish to talk and would keep the hooks in the water until tired and then take the catch home, clean them and our bounty would often provide supper.

Bluegill, redear, warmouth, green sunfish and longear sunfish are some of the fishes

that are often referred to as bream and they can all provide great angling action. In this part of the Natural State bodies of water like Lake Ashbaugh, Reynolds Lake, Walcott, Lake Charles, Portia Bay, Hill Slough and many other unnamed backouts, ponds and oxbows are full of bream eager to protect their beds as they begin the spawn. Typically the fish of this area run a little on the smaller size and may not be big enough to fillet, but are the right size to scale, remove the head and fry. Larger bream can be found with a short drive to haunts like Midway, Old Town, Horseshoe Lake, Wapanocca or Reelfoot Lake in Tennessee.

Once a specific body of water has been located gather a few tackle basics and head to the water. Keep things simple with number four light wire hooks, small split shot and a float just large enough to hold the offering suspended in the water column. Favored baits include crickets or worms while small jigs can be deadly for anyone who would prefer an artificial offering. These can be presented with spincast or spinning tackle but our favorite way is to use a ten-to-twelve-foot jigging pole that allows precise placement of the bait in likely areas.

As water temperatures reach about seventy degrees in a given body of water the bream

action will begin. The moon phase can be a good indicator of activity as these fish tend to gather in larger groups in the days around the full moon. Weather changes can impact the fishing for a day or two, but bream are not as moody as some other fish and often bounce back within a day or so after a weather change.

A fancy, fast boat is not needed and might even be a hindrance in the close quarters around the cypress trees and buckbrush these fish call home. A johnboat with a sculling paddle or light trolling motor is plenty to reach fish in most lakes. Throw in a lifejacket and a cooler with ice to hold the fish and let the fishing begin.

Dad and I are fortunate to have some great memories from some "interesting" days on the water and I hope each of you will take some time and get out and make your own memories. We have upgraded the boat just a little and I get the front seat and guide the boat with a trolling motor. We have changed our food choices slightly and have even gotten an extra cooler to keep fish and drinks separate but the memories are just as grand each and every day we hit the water.

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

"She doesn't let anything slow her down" One Tough

aving a sick child can be difficult for any mother, but Dana Cullen has spent the last seven years learning to appreciate life, watching her 7-year-old daughter undergo various surgeries.

Josie Melton was born with VACTERL association, a disorder affecting different body systems that includes vertebral defects, anal atresia, cardiac defects, tracheo-esophageal fistula, renal anomalies and limb abnormalities. Josie's vertebrae, heart, renal system and limbs were affected at birth.

"Every one of her vertebrae are malformed," Dana said. "Most of the ribs on the left side of her body were fused together."

In January 2011, Josie had expandable rods attached to her ribs to separate them. She was also born with one kidney, her heart more on her right side and her left leg smaller than her right. Dana said she knew before Josie was born she would need expert medical care. She delivered Josie at University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences and was immediately transferred to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Arkansas Children's Hospital for six weeks.

"I'm convinced the dedication and perseverance of her team, combined with the prayers of so many close to us, got her through those first uncertain weeks, and finally home," Dana said. "Our NICU team encouraged me to be a partner in her care and taught me how to be an unwavering advocate for my daughter."

Dana and Josie continue to travel to Philadelphia for surgeries, 20 so far in Josie's short seven years. She will continue with the surgeries until she stops growing. "It's very hard to turn your child over to a surgeon and walk away," Dana said.

Despite multiple surgeries, Josie rarely complains and always has a smile on her face. Dana said even though her daughter misses quite a lot of school, she remains at the top of the class and can run faster than the boys in her P.E. course.

"She doesn't let anything slow her down," Dana added. In 2014 Josie was chosen as an ambassador for Arkansas Children's Hospital. She attends events benefiting the hospital and shares her story in Northeast Arkansas. At last year's Super Hero Dash-N-Bash, Josie dressed up in a cape and handed out medals to runners. While the job is exciting and fun, Josie takes her role as ambassador very seriously.

"My favorite part is that we get to help children and get some money for them," Josie said.

When she isn't undergoing surgery or working on behalf of ACH, Josie enjoys playing with Barbies, singing, dancing, playing outside and spending time with her 14-year-old brother Zach. Together, Dana and Josie like getting manicures and shopping, especially at the bookstore.

Josie's condition is rare but for other children going through similar situations, she has wise words. "I just say, 'Just be brave,'" she said.

"Josie has always lived her life as though she has no limitations and we encourage that as well," Dana said. "Her surgeon always tells me he can fix anything that breaks, except her spirit."

The 7-year-old's unwavering bravery has not only touched her medical team, but her family as well.

Dana said Josie has made her consider how important it is to embrace and enjoy each day with loved ones.

"My life completely changed when Josie was born, for the better," Dana said.

And with Josie's constant smile and playful demeanor, the mother-daughter team is sure to meet any struggle with patience and strength. •



Greene County Tech Odyssey of the Mind

Greene County Tech Sends Three Teams to Odyssey of the Mind World Finals

OM Teams, are you ready? For years OM teams across the nation and in over 25 countries have heard these words as a prompt to begin their long term performance. This year three Greene County Tech teams will hear this question at OM World Finals held at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa. OM was created by Dr. Sam Micklus. He developed the first problem to challenge his Industrial Design class at Rowan University in New Jersey. In 1978, the first creative-problem solving competition was held. OM started in Arkansas in 1983 and at GCT in 1985. Physics teacher Mike Woodside organized a team to participate in the balsa wood problem. The program has expanded to include students competing in all five problems from grades 4 to 12.

This year GCT had 11 teams competing in Regionals at Pocahontas, earning six 1st place and four 2nd place medals. They advanced to State OM at ASU-Beebe, winning two 1st place trophies, one 2nd place, four 3rd place and one 4th place medal.

GCT Jr. High has its first ever team advancing to OM World Finals. Winning

1st place at state in Stack Attack and heading to Ames are 9th graders, Jackson Barr, Dakota Hudson, Jacob Ross, Elijah Ritter, and Devin Smith and 10th graders Trisha Adams and Alissa Moore. Coached by PACE teacher Jessica Gazaway and Gregory Spooner, they were challenged to build

a balsa wood structure 8 1/2" tall and weighing 15 grams. At state, the team's structure held 695 pounds. The weight held, their problem solution, and presentation earned them 1st place.

GCT Middle School has two teams advancing to OM World Finals. The first team competed in No-Cycle Recycle. Winning 1st place were 6th graders, Abby Dunn, Jaden Henson, Josh Nelson, Jared Noel, Sam Scott and Gage Snyder and 7th grader Jacie Andrews. Coaches Marilyn Jerome and Darrah Snyder supervised the team as they designed and built a vehicle to carry two team's members. It had to navigate

My philosophy is that people are celebrities incognito, heroes in hiding. I believe that when I create an environment where someone can truly be themselves, the results are magic, every time.



For dogs, if a female has her max litter and her puppies do the same and the cycle continues they can produce 67,000 dogs."

Since many animals are euthanized daily due to overpopulation, Kaleigh said her group's efforts "prevented over three million animals from being born just to be euthanized because there are too many or being dumped on the side of the road and abused.'

She has helped make more than 150 dog houses out of recycled materials in the past year and used donated Styrofoam coolers to make 46 cat shelters. "The number of shelters made will grow in time," she said. "I got the idea to make the shelters because of a viral Facebook photo of an animal frozen to death due to winter weather. The shelters are given away for free because of my motto, 'No excuses.' She said there are no excuses for someone not to have a house for a dog or a cat when they are free.
